41PD Realizes an undercover Operation

During the night of Sunday, April 12th, Sanho Oil became the scene of a major 41PD operation connected to the ongoing investigation into the Ortega Cartel.

The operation, named Fog Grey, was launched after recent reports suggested criminal activity between the Ortega Cartel and the 41Cult. At around 2 AM, officers of the 41 Police Department raided a cult office located at the Sanho Oil refinery. During the operation, documents and electronic devices were confiscated, which may contain information about future criminal plans.

The Chief of 41PD described the operation as a complete success and praised the bravery and discipline of the officers involved. According to the department, this marks a major step forward in the investigation.

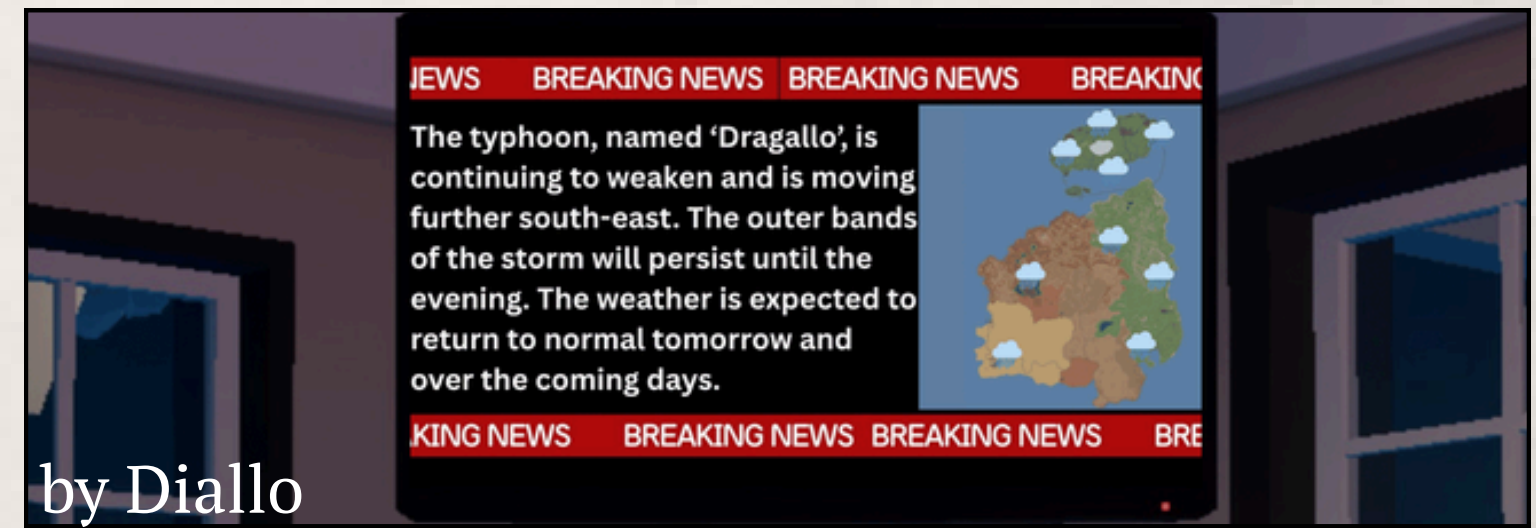
“We will continue working hard to clean crime from our streets and make the safety of our citizens a reality, not just a dream,” the Chief stated.

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Old Copper Mines Reopen as Islands Secure Heavy Industry Supply

As demand across Jeju Island and Oji Island continues to grow, local authorities have been forced to act. The mainland can no longer meet the islands' rising need for heavy industrial equipment, with many shipments reportedly being prioritized for larger industrial regions and fast-growing boom cities.

In response, the governments of Jeju and Oji have decided to secure more resources locally. One of the biggest steps is the reopening of the old copper mines, which will once again supply materials needed by local factories.

These factories are now preparing new Heavyload cargo for island transport companies, including 20MVA- and 50MVA transformers, and tankers. The tankers are expected to play an important role in the local oil and fuel industry, helping to cover the rising demand across both islands.

For now, the newly produced transformers are mainly being prepared for export in an effort to fill gaps in the public budget. However, sources close to government talks suggest that they could eventually be used for local power and energy infrastructure, further reducing the islands' dependence on the mainland.

Officials describe the move as an important step toward industrial independence. For drivers, however, it means something much simpler: the mines are open again, the factories are working, and the heaviest loads on the islands are ready to roll.
